
Shimizu Town is located between Numazu City and Mishima City. It literally means "a town where clean water springs." Its symbolic center is the Kakita River.

In the middle of this urban area, water surprisingly springs from the ground and creates a river which is 1,200 meters long and 30 to 50 meters wide. It then flows on to meet the Kano River, which originates from the Izu Amagi Mountain range.

The water of the Kakita River is abundant and its temperature is approximately 15 degrees Celsius almost all the year. The quality of the water is extremely high and about 300 thousand tons of water a day is supplied to meet the needs of roughly 350 thousand people as well as factories in the eastern area of Shizuoka Prefecture.

The river produces a rich natural environment along both its sides, preserving the precious ecosystem. The thriving animal and plant populations are a barometer of the cleanliness of the Kakita River. The beauty woven by its rich water is admired nationwide and was designated as one of "The Best 100 Scenes of Japan to be Preserved in the 21st Century" in 1983 and "The Best 100 Waters of Japan" in 1985. It continues inviting many people to visit it.



Melt Water Gushing Out with a Rush

Incomparable in its cleanliness although it is an urban river, the Kakita River is an undercurrent of the Mt. Fuji range. About 8,500 years ago, a great eruption of Mt. Fuji brought a large amount of lava to the upper part of the Kakita River. The lava, named "Mishima Yoganryu—the Mishima Lava Flow", is characterized by its many holes, which makes it easy for water to go through it.

Underneath the lava is a layer of "Ko Fuji Kazan-Old Fuji Volcano", which is not

permeable to water. This makes the rain and snow fallen on Mt. Fuji go down to the Mishima Lava Flow under the ground. The amount of water which gushes out with a rush from under Route 1 in Shimizu Town, 40 km away from Mt. Fuji, is estimated to be approximately 1 million tons a day. It is said to be the largest amount of all springs in Asia.




Our Wish to Preserve the History This River Knows and Pass it on to the Next Generation



First Observation Deck 第一展望台

Here we find the origin of the Kakita River. Several "Wakima" springs of various sizes can be seen from the deck. "Wakima" is a spring of melt water and rain from Mt. Fuji which rises up from under nearby Route 1. Kingfisher birds can be seen to hover and catch sweet fish. From late October to December, sweet fish are spotted coming up toward the upper part of the river





Kingfisher (the broad-billed roller order / the kingfisher family)

The kingfisher has a dark green head with small blue spots on it. Its

body is blue-green and orange. It is a beautiful bird called "a jade in a mountain stream." It glides from trees on the bank or hovers to dive

The kingfisher is the designated official bird of Shimizu Town.

This spring water was once used for drinking by a spinning factory. Sunshine and sand produce intriguing colors in the water. The temperature of the water is stable and the water level hardly changes. This keeps the river the same as it was many years ago.

The Kakita River is the source of water for many people in eastern Shizuoka Prefecture and provides a unique chance in an urban spot to see rare fauna and flora. Its magnificent scenery has been our blessing. However, when many houses were built in the surrounding area along the river, there were concerns that it would be very difficult to protect and maintain the river if it were left without any care. Therefore, the town created Kakita River Park in order to protect and maintain the area's nature for the community. In April 1986, Kakita

River Park opened as a peaceful communal area for its citizens. Favorite places include the first and second observation decks, from where wakima, the springs, can constantly be seen. There is also a popular wading place where people can step into the water and cool off. The Kakita River will be preserved by Shimizu Town for years to come as a place to learn the beauty of nature and nurture a love for

Sweet Fish (the sweet fish family)

The sweet fish is a freshwater fish of the sweet fish family living in clean streams. It is approximately 30 centimeters long. Its body is streamlined and it has an oil fin. Adult fish which come up the river make a territory of about one square meter and eat the moss covering the stones on the riverbed. Sweet fish live only one year and come down the river in late fall to spawn. The sweet fish come down the Kano River and many of them enter the Kakita River, which is warmer than the Kano River. A school of them can be seen spawning in the sandy parts of the riverbed.

(The fish with spots in the picture are *kasago* of the salmon family.)

Mishima Baikamo (the buttercup family)



This is named Mishima Baikamo because the yellow flower looks like a plum blossom. It is sensitive to water pollution so it is found only in the middle or upper parts of the Kakita River. This is one of the symbolic plants of the Kakita River, which takes root in the sand in the clean spring water.

Mishima Baikamo generally blooms from May to September, but in the Kakita River it keeps blooming all year round. It originally was found in the Kohamaike Pond of Rakujuen Park in Mishima City, and it used to be seen in rivers in Mishima City, but it has disappeared. The Kakita River is the only level place where Mishima Baikamo is found in a colony.

Aohadatombo (the kawatombo family)



The Aohadatombo is found in clean waters which have many water plants. It is a very rare dragonfly which only lives along the Kakita River. Both male and female Aohadatombo have very beautiful shiny metallic-green bodies. The female has white dots on the edge of its wings, which make it easy to distinguish the female from the male. Aohadatombo can usually be seen from later May to early July. However, in the Kakita River, they are observed until early November.

In Kakita River Park, there are several springs of various shapes and sizes. The one called Funatsukiba has the remains of two wells once used by a paper manufacturing company, where clean water is seen to come up. A run of sweet fish can also be seen here in the winter

Mokusei Yatsuhashi –The Wooden Walkway

This is a walkway people enjoy walking along to see the graceful flow of the middle part of the Kakita River. An abundant volume of spring water can be seen here.

- Do not throw coins or other things into the springs.
